

THE SECOND LESSON ~ 1 Peter 2:19-25

It is a credit to you if, being aware of God, you endure pain while suffering unjustly. If you endure when you are beaten for doing wrong, what credit is that? But if you endure when you do right and suffer for it, you have God's approval. For to this you have been called, because Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example, so that you should follow in his steps. "He committed no sin, and no deceit was found in his mouth." When he was abused, he did not return abuse; when he suffered, he did not threaten; but he entrusted himself to the one who judges justly. He himself bore our sins in his body on the cross, so that, free from sins, we might live for righteousness; by his wounds you have been healed. For you were going astray like sheep, but now you have returned to the shepherd and guardian of your souls.

Jesus said, "Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them. So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly."







THE INVITATION TO AND DISTRIBUTION OF HOLY COMMUNION

All persons are welcome at the Lord's table; to receive Holy Communion or a Blessing. Baptized Christians of all ages and denomination may receive the elements. To receive a blessing rather than the elements, cross your arms over your chest as you kneel at the altar rail. To receive communion please hold out your crossed hands, open palms up, for the bread, and then help guide the chalice to your lips to receive the wine; cross your arms over your chest if you do not wish to receive the wine. Please blot lipstick before drinking from the chalice. You may also allow the chalice minister to dip the bread into the wine and place it on your tongue and it is permissible to receive only the bread if you like.

To receive an individual prayer of healing with anointing (Unction), go to the chapel after you receive Communion.

Kneel as you are able at the altar rail in the chapel leaving some space between you and the next person for privacy.

Return to the cathedral after the priest has prayed with you.

Post- Easter Study Program: One God, Shared Stories and Three Faiths


Wednesdays, April 26, May 10, May 24, May 31 and June 7 at 1:30 PM (note: No class on May 3 and 17) and a Saturday session on May 27—10:00 AM to 3:00 PM with lunch. All sessions will be held in the Martin Room at the Cathedral.

Judaism, Christianity and Islam share the belief in the same one God and are all religions of 'the Book' (Old Testament-Tanak, New Testament and Quran), but nonetheless they have been competitive with each other—sometime violently. In this program we will look at what Judaism, Christianity and Islam share, areas in which they compete and why they don't get along better than they do (and have for centuries).

Most of us have Bibles containing the Old and New Testaments; many of us don't have a Quran. I suggest ordering the Oxford World Classics Quran. On Amazon Prime it is currently listed at \$6.47. For the more adventurous, I recommend *The Study Quran: A New Translation and Commentary*, which is excellent, long (nearly 2,000 pages) and expensive (about \$50). Also valuable for an understanding of Islam is the *Hadith*, or the sayings of the prophet. Note that the Quran is what Allah dictated to the Prophet Mohammed, not the inspirations of the prophet that are found in the Hadith. There are a number of editions of the Hadith available from Amazon.

Most of us know quite a lot (some, a little) about Judaism and Christianity and little about Islam; I will recommend several books that seek to tell more about the inter-relations between and among the religions from their inceptions to the present time. The most accessible is Jon Levinson's, *Inheriting Abraham: The Legacy of the Patriarch in Judaism, Christianity & Islam.* More expansive and expensive are Robert Gregg's, *Shared Stories, Rival Tellings: Early Encounters of Jews, Christians and Muslims* (Oxford University Press) and F. E. Peters, *The Monotheists: Jews, Christians and Muslims in Conflict and Competition* (Princeton University Press, 2 volumes). Both are long, somewhat difficult and expensive.

The more, the merrier—so don't be shy to invite your friends to join us!





May 7, 2017 – Easter 4 (A): Ecumenical and Interreligious Relations

The Episcopal Church's Office of Ecumenical and Interreligious Relations helps to facilitate relationships with other Christian traditions and major world religions. The Presiding Bishop is the ecumenical officer of the church, and his Ecumenical and Interreligious Deputy is the Reverend Margaret Rose. The work of this office in the Jesus Movement represents an important force for reconciliation and religious understanding, promoting conversation and unity.



The modern ecumenical movement began as a response to Jesus' prayer in the Gospel of John "that they all may be one," and the twentieth century saw a rapid increase of collaboration and conversation across church lines. It gained special momentum after the Second Vatican Council, when a spirit of greater openness between Roman Catholics and Christians of other traditions emerged.

The Episcopal Church is currently in full communion relationships with the following churches: the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, the Moravian Church of the Northern and Southern Provinces, the Old Catholic Churches of the Union of Utrecht, the Philippine Independent Church, and the Mar Thoma Syrian Church of India. Coordinating committees support the implementation of some of these relationships, which involve full mutual recognition of ministries and sacraments. Clergy of these churches may serve in Episcopal churches, and vice versa. We also have warm relationships with the Church of Sweden and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Bavaria.

The Episcopal Church is in active dialogue with three traditions: the Roman Catholic Church through the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), and the United Methodist Church. Our dialogues meet regularly to discuss matters of common concern, doctrinal agreements and disagreements, and possibilities for the emergence of full communion relationships.

Nationally and internationally, The Episcopal Church is a member of major groupings of churches, particularly the National Council of Churches, the World Council of Churches, Churches Uniting in Christ, Church World Service, Churches for Middle East Peace, and Christian Churches Together. We also collaborate with the Consultation on Common Texts, an ecumenical group that standardizes English-language liturgical materials and lectionaries.

The Episcopal Church also works in close collaboration with Religions for Peace, Bread for the World, the Parliament of the World's Religions, the Anti-Defamation League, the U.S. Council of Muslim Organizations, the National Religious Partnership for the Environment, and the Anglican Communion Network for Interfaith Concerns to promote religious understanding and a voice for The Episcopal Church in non-governmental organizations and public advocacy.

Each diocese of The Episcopal Church has a designated officer responsible for promoting ecumenical and interreligious conversations on the local level. A national umbrella group, Episcopal Diocesan Ecumenical and Interreligious Officers (EDEIO), coordinates the work of diocesan officers in close collaboration with the Ecumenical Office. This group meets annually during the National Workshop on Christian Unity for fellowship and learning with colleagues from Roman Catholic, United Methodist, Evangelical Lutheran, Evangelical, and Presbyterian parallel organizations.
