THE FIRST LESSON - Wisdom of Solomon 3:1-9

The souls of the righteous are in the hand of God, and no torment will ever touch them. For though in the sight of others they were punished, their hope is full of immortality. THE SECOND LESSON ~ Revelation 21:1-6a

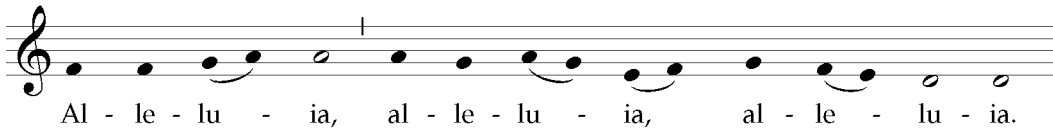
