



A Goodbye and a Hello

Deacon Priscilla Maumus

Dear Friends,

It has been five years since the Advent I when I first came to you as your deacon and now, with a sad heart but joyful memories, I announce my retirement as of Third Epiphany.



As most of you know, I have been struggling the last several years to balance the needs of my aging parents with the demands of my two jobs, as your deacon and as archdeacon of the diocese. Now, as my parents' needs both for my attention and my management of their affairs increase, I realize that my ministerial duties in the church must decrease. I cannot be fully present to you as your deacon while so many other duties vie for my attention. At the request of the Bishop, I will remain Archdeacon and will be moving to an office in the Noland Center as of January 25th. Many of these duties can be performed remotely and on a varying schedule, unlike my duties at the Cathedral.

I have loved both you and this place and will miss both greatly. But I am reminded that, for Christians, all roads lead through Calvary and it is only through an ongoing process of relinquishment (non-attachment) that we find peace and the space for new life.

I say "Goodbye" to you and "Hello" to unknown challenges and rewards that lie ahead. I say "Goodbye", a contraction of "God be with you," knowing that God is indeed with you, both through your rich history and through the plentiful gifts each of you bring to this congregation and to the world.

One of the roles of the deacon is to point out to the baptized the unique gifts each person brings for manifesting the Realm of God in a broken and confusing world. As I write this on the Feast of St. Andrew, I am reminded that he had a gift for noticing and facilitating. When Greeks are seeking Jesus, Philip relates their need to Andrew, who arranges the introductions. So, too, do you every Sunday when you welcome visitors to our worship and coffee hour. Many are transient visitors, just passing through, curious about us or desiring to experience our liturgy and music – or to hear words the Good News in one way or another. Others are wanting spiritual or physical nourishment – or both. And you do a wonderful job of welcoming them and meeting them wherever they are on their journeys, as do the staff, especially Suzette, during the week. Please continue noticing and responding to those who come to our doors.

At another time, when Jesus is asking the disciples how to feed the large crowd following him, Philip responds that "six months wages would not be enough to get each one a little," but Andrew points out a boy with five barley loaves and two fish. He sees potential plenty where Philip sees limiting scarcity. We, like Philip, are often overwhelmed by what the Talmud calls "the enormity of the world's grief." How do we have the resources (time, money, talent) to respond to the material and spiritual hunger that surrounds us?

The story tells us two things: First, we do not need to do

everything ourselves. We simply present the gifts and God does the work of applying them where they are most needed. From the seemingly meager gift of the five loaves and two fishes, Jesus feeds five thousand. So, the message is "Just make a start." Second, it also tells us that we do not need towering talent to make a difference. Whatever God has given us in time, resources, or talent is sufficient.

There is another angle, too. Children in ancient times were not regarded as worth noticing or has having anything to contribute, but Andrew notices. Often, we think of those on the margins as having nothing to contribute to us, but their gifts are not to be disregarded. They can tell us what it is like to be poor, to be imprisoned, to be neglected or oppressed. They are wise and capable partners, if we let them, in helping heal a wounded world. We can join with them in advocacy for justice: just wages, just living conditions, just access to services and privileges. We can become just neighbors in both senses of the word – "fair" as well as "equal" neighbors. Jericho Road's ongoing transformation of neighborhood and neighbors offers this continuing possibility as do Eracism and the monthly legal clinics. The ministries of Grace at the Green Light and UNITY of New Orleans bring us into contact with our neighbors. Daughters of the King is partnering with Eden House.

In this Epiphany season, I hope you will remember that you are the manifestation of the Light of the World to the world and will commit to an ongoing ministry that utilizes your unique gifts and brings you into contact with your neighbors in a way which recognizes and encourages them to use their gifts.

For instance, we have a wonderful gardening ministry here, but we could expand it. Before Katrina, a gardener friend who has since moved out of town worked with new residents of Habitat for Humanity homes to plan and plant sustainable, low-maintenance gardens and to teach them how to maintain them. The partnership over flowers bloomed into ongoing relationships. We could do the same with Jericho Road homeowners.

There are many opportunities to serve. Suzette has copies of the UNITY Directory of services in the office. The Diocesan Asset Map (http://edola.episcopalassetmap.org/) is also a good resource If you look into these you will find out the many services in our community where you could volunteer and make a difference. For instance, those with medical skills could organize a neighborhood blood pressure clinic on a monthly basis or volunteer with St. Anna's Medical Van. Those with business skills could volunteer a neighborhood workshop on financial management or assist with a Junior Achievement project in a neighborhood school.

As the darkest time of the year yields to the lengthening days of Spring, I hope you will take the time to think about the seeds of hope you can plant in the world—that you will find a new way to say "Hello" to your neighbors.

I also hope that when you hear the dismissal, "Go in peace to love and serve the LORD," you will hear the dismissal I have always longed to give, "Go in peace – and get your rears in gear!"

May the peace of the LORD be always with you – and continue to be a burr under your saddle!

These obstacles to homeownership are difficult for any homebuyer, and can be downright overwhelming to a family with limited resources.

The costs to build a starter home in the New Orleans area puts the sales price beyond that which a family in the low-to-moderate income bracket can afford. Financial resources that fill the void between what a family can afford and the home sales price are referred to as gap financing. The layering of multiple gap financing resources is essential to overall mortgage buy-downs to actual affordable levels. Traditional gap financing programs such as Soft Second Mortgages, Individual Development Accounts (IDA) and Down Payment and Closing Costs Assistance Programs are an integral part of the process but are very limited.

In this post-Katrina environment of skyrocketing market rate rents and home sales in addition to a decrease in subsidized housing units, affordable homeownership development offers one of the few opportunities for low-to-moderate income working families to build wealth. Jericho Road works closely with first time homebuyers who face the daunting challenge of addressing barriers to affordable homeownership.

This giving season we want to introduce *The American Dream Fund*. One answer to filling the gap between a home's sale price and the amount a low-income family can actually qualify for in a mortgage is a Soft Second Mortgage. With your contribution to The American Dream Fund, Jericho Road can provide Soft Second Mortgages to those who qualify. A Soft Second Mortgage through Jericho Road is one that accrues no interest and is forgiven over a period of 15 years. The American Dream Fund is established specifically for the purpose of funding Soft Second Mortgages for first time low income working families.
