



From The Dean...

On March 1, our Real Presence liturgy begins its second year. It has been a delight to observe this service move from concept to reality over the past twelve months. It has become the principal Sunday liturgy for a core group of Cathedral members, while many others attend on an occasional basis. The biggest surprise for me is that there are some people who attend both the 10AM and 6PM liturgies almost every week. This underscores the very different qualities and sensibilities of the two services, and the fact that they address different aspects of our spiritual hunger.



The other very exciting aspect of Real Presence is that it draws many worshippers from outside the Cathedral Community, even outside the Episcopal family. We have created a unique worship experience that is accessible to those new to the Church without watering down or over simplifying our rich heritage of solemn, stately worship. The use of subdued candlelight, reflective music and the encouragement to move freely to thoughtfully designed prayer areas during the service creates an atmosphere of holy freedom where the Spirit seems to thrive.

This year, the Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Holy Week (April 2-4) will be Real Presence liturgies. These will take place at 6PM and, because Real Presence has been a big hit with our young people, there will not be a separate program for them this year. It is my hope that this will give persons an opportunity to experience this service that have not been able to do so on a Sunday evening. It also makes it possible for members of the wider Diocese to participate in this liturgy that they may want to recreate in their own worship space.

Let us give God thanks for the creative leadership that has been raised up to bring Real Presence into being, and pray that it continues to thrive as a vehicle for carrying the Gospel of Christ to all corners of our Community.

2012 LENTEN STUDY: FORGIVENESS

Sunday mornings during Coffee Hour Class and Tuesday evenings 6:30-7:30 p.m. in Advent House Leader: Father Morris

FORGIVENESS: A religious gimmick, or something we really need? Who needs to forgive whom? Sin and floating guilt? Is your sin original? St. Paul and forgiveness: if Christ is the author of our salvation, Paul is the author of our understanding of that salvation. This is a necessary starting-point. Salvation from what and for what? A Jewish/ Christian understanding of what it means to be human. What Christ accomplished on our behalf.

LATER DEVELOPMENTS: Leftovers from John Calvin's theology haunt American Christianity, leading to obsessions with guilt and a preoccupation with personal religious experience. Anglican Christianity offers a more balanced and biblically-based approach to understanding our humanity, and relates forgiveness to the sacraments of Baptism and the Eucharist.

FAMOUS COMMENTATORS: C. S. Lewis, an English Anglican, is a famous expositor of Christianity. We'll look at his best-known book, Mere Christianity, widely studied and widely appreciated. Desmond Tutu, the internationally famous Archbishop of Cape Town, has pioneered attempting to reconcile nations and peoples. He's worth a look, too. Both present forgiveness as genuine redemptive processes which materially affect our lives and the lives of those around us.

CONFESSION: A personal approach to sin and forgiveness, which tries to help us move beyond feelings of guilt and relief toward something more lasting. It includes confession in the presence of a priest, which is a part of our tradition you may choose to use, if you think it would be helpful, but which is never required.

Each segment will stand alone. We'll try to the disciplined about ending on time. There's no expected 'homework', but some printed materials will be distributed to facilitate our discussion.

Advent House is located on the corner of 7th Street & Carondelet.

Lenten Practice

People often say they are 'giving something up for Lent' and this acknowledges the penitential nature of the season as Christians prepare spiritually for Holy Week and Easter. Another way to prepare during this season is to 'take something on'. That is, to add some additional religious practice to one's life.

Attending a weekday 12:15 p.m. service or the Saturday 9:30 am service are two options. Here are other opportunities: Attending a Christian Formation class at 9 am on Sunday mornings, attending the Coffee Hour class, attending Bible Study on Wednesday mornings, attending the Book Club, giving Christian Yoga a try or using the Lenten Meditation booklet.

Consider 'taking something on' this Lent.

FILL A MITE BOX

A beloved tradition of Lent is to make a special Lenten offering of money gathered in a mite box; you may have done this when you were a child. Well, mite boxes are for adults, too!

Our Lenten Offering is sent each year to Heifer

International which provides animals and the knowledge to care for them to people in need around the world. Heifer has begun a new project in Haiti, REACH: Rural Entrepreneurs for Agricultural



Cooperation in Haiti and our money will go to support that specific project. REACH will build up four livestock sub-sectors (goats, cattle, poultry and pigs), using integrated farming to improve production and strengthen linkages with buyers. This Heifer project will help to rehabilitate and change the lives of 20,250 Haitian families.

Greetings from Advent House:

Good News... The Book Club will resume on Monday, February 27 at 1:00 at Advent House. The group has decided to read Four Loves by CS Lewis. I purchased the audio book and to my surprise it is CS Lewis reading the book. It was recorded in 1970. The CD is clear and very well done. There is a study guide to go with the CD that will allow everyone a chance to participate in the discussions. No homework... you don't have to read the book ahead of time. I would estimate we will spend for 4 to 6 weeks with CS Lewis...



A bit about the book....

In this remarkable recording, CS Lewis shows why millions of readers have acclaimed him the greatest spokesman for Christianity in the 20th century. In a resonant, baritone voice, Lewis explores the nature of the four Greek words that are translated love in English. Storge (affection); Philia (friendship); Eros (erotic love); Agape (selfless love)

Instead of giving us a dry, theological treatise, Lewis makes the subject extremely personal and practical by showing us how easily natural loves can go wrong and pollute our relationships. He shows that what we often tend to excuse as natural behavior is really selfish and destructive.

Lewis explores these pitfalls in our loves in order to lead us to the solution - Godlike agape love that God has for men and women and the kind we must develop and nurture in our relationships.

As in his writing, Lewis doesn't merely tell, he shows these loves in action with vivid and often humorous illustrations. The images are so realistically drawn and so alive you are sure to recognize someone you know or live with – or maybe even yourself.

Try to come... you won't be disappointed.


Dean duPlantier begins a study of the Book of Psalms on Wednesday mornings at 11 a.m. in the Westfeldt Room.

From the Theologian in Residence...

THE GREAT CONTRACEPTION DEBATE involving health care coverage is full of ambivalence and confusion. The Obama administration says it is a women's health issue. The Roman Catholic bishops say it is a religious liberty issue. The most striking thing about the conflict is lack of clarity. It's a classic political issue: You can see it as the faithful believers vs. the dictatorial secularists, or as the compassionate regulators vs. the authoritarian nay-sayers.

THE QUESTION IS IMPORTANT. There are issues of faith and practice involved. What's right? What's responsible? What is responsive to the will of God? When does use or refusal to use pass over into abuse? What is compatible with faithful living? What actions deny the sacramental character of our sexuality? Maintaining that contraception is always right trivializes it. Dismissing it as always wrong ignores substantive issues of our lives and disregards our human partnership with God in creation.


WHAT THE OBAMA administration announced was not a shocking new initiative. It has been around since 2000 and has already been tested in the courts. What was new was the disallowance of a deductible. The outrage seemed more planned than spontaneous, part of the reaction to the health care reform act: The Roman Catholic bishops campaign against it was prepared in advance.

THE ODDITY is that the Roman Catholic Church lost the battle about birth control in the United States some time ago. Confessors no longer ask about it. A reported 98% of Roman Catholic women use it. Yet, the Vatican continues to oppose it. There is a great gulf between official teaching and the lives of the faithful. However, because the bishops are the Vatican's front-line troops, they are not allowed to retreat or surrender. Roman Catholic institutions are also expected to enlist or risk losing their certificates of authenticity.

THE ISSUE displays the confusion of our national situation. We are officially committed to the separation of Church and State--a phrase that does not appear in the Constitution, but in a letter by Thomas Jefferson. That does not mean the separation of religion from life. It means maintaining the independence of civil and ecclesiastical institutions. However, church-related institutions and government have become significantly intertwined through finance and regulation related to funding educational and helping ministries, and relationships are growing closer. So far, we have not sorted out the implications of that: Can church institutions resist even reasonable regulation on the grounds of religious liberty? Or does public funding for public services create an obligation to play ball with Federal policy even if that involves some compromise? The Obama administration thinks that it is legitimate to specify what church-related universities, hospitals, and charities must provide in their health-care coverage. They say that benefits should be even-handed and not arbitrary or whimsical. However, some churches, and especially the Roman Catholic Church, say that Health and Human Services is trying to force them to provide coverages that they are theologically and ethically opposed to.

THE TECHNOCRATS of the Obama administration want to apply one rule to everyone. We can see their point. They want simplicity and clarity. However, that does not honor the inherent messiness of real-life democracy. The demand for even-handed coverage, however intended, comes across to many people as a violation of liberty of faith and conscience. That is why the Obama administration has backed off somewhat. Taking this initiative in an election year was a major 'oops.' In practice, the government does not get to define what constitutes a violation of religious liberty. People do. Life is going to win, rather than an idea, or some notion of bureaucratic neatness.
