## From The Dean...

In the simpler days in which the Episcopal Church grew up, most Americans spent their entire lives in the same community. When people did relocate it was generally considered to be trading one permanent home for another, and one put down deep roots in one's new community. It was considered normative for the American Christian population to remain members of the same denomination when they relocated and the Episcopal Church had clear and specific ways to keep track of membership. These rules are still in effect today, but much harder to make sense of given the mobility of our current society. The Episcopal Parish where one is Baptized, Confirmed or Received is where one's membership is recorded. Membership only changes if the person dies or contacts the Parish and requests a formal letter of transfer to another Episcopal Church (we cannot transfer persons to other denominations except perhaps the ELCA with whom we are in full communion).



One technically cannot concurrently be a member of more than one Parish, and this is where things get confused. In our time, people move frequently and often switch between all manner of Christian communities. Instead of formal handwritten membership registers, we use computerized databases to track membership, contributions and family information. Trying to conform old categories with new technology is an administrative horror show. Yet, our bylaws and the reporting rules of the Episcopal Church require that we track and categorize those who worship here. We also want to be accurate in our Parish Directory and send mailings to people who want to receive them.

To this end, our current policy is to consider one an active member if they attend services here at least three times a year and (as far as we know) consider this to be their Parish Church. In order to be eligible to vote at the Cathedral Annual Meeting, members must also be known to the Treasurer (i.e. they must have made a financial contribution to the Cathedral during the previous calendar year).

In order to share in the Eucharist (Holy Communion) one must have received the sacrament of Baptism by Water and the Holy Spirit (in any Christian Church). Baptism is how one becomes a Christian; to become an Episcopalian one is either confirmed (or received in the case of those previously confirmed by a Bishop in the Roman Catholic or Orthodox churches) by the Bishop during his annual visitation. Once confirmed one is eligible to stand for election to the Vestry and other Diocesan offices.

The bottom line is that everyone is welcome in this place and these various categories are never intended to be barriers to full participation in our common life. We want you to be as engaged as you like in the Cathedral community and do our very best to communicate with you about the many opportunities for worship, Christian formation and ministry in the wider community. Please let us know if there are ways we could be doing this more effectively.

For the past eight months I have been involved in a community service project called Heart of Passion. Heart of Passion is a nonprofit organization that hosts a wonderful event called Red Carpet Day, or RCD. RCD was founded by a cancer survivor named Savannah Solomon who was diagnosed with cancer at the age of 11. Savannah had a dream to create an event where teens with cancer would be able to have the best week of their lives on a retreat in her hometown of Atlanta. Savannah's dream has now become reality and has now spread to New Orleans for its tenth year. She tied the heart of Ephesians 2:10, the passion that comes from James 4:17, and the leadership lessons in all of Proverbs 31 (specifically verses 8-9) in order to create the name Heart of Passion.

## *From the Theologian in Residence...*

### NUMBERS

RELIGIOUS STATISTICS are notoriously hard to evaluate. Different groups count differently. Some of the numbers are self-serving, designed more to present a pleasing picture than for accuracy. There's no official fact-gatherer. The U. S. Census could, but never does, ask questions about religion. The numbers we have come either from churches or from private researchers.

*The Christian Century* (April 18, 2012, William McKinney: "Crunching the Numbers") recently summarized five recent statistical surveys published by Baylor, Princeton, the Hartford Institute for Religious Research, and the Pew Forum on Religion and Public Life. Taken together, they offer about as good a picture as we're going to get of the state of American religion right now.

"Right now" is a key component here. The American situation is fluid and changeful. Even though we continue to be the most religious of developed countries, the overall statistics mask considerable change and great regional differences. Forty-four percent of Americans have changed their religious affiliation in adulthood. Denominational loyalty is currently not a potent motivator. The South is very religious--over 50% go to church in a given week. In the Northeast and the Northwest, those numbers drop into the low twenties. The cliché that conservative churches grow and liberal churches do not doesn't pan out. What seems to matter most are congregational vitality, a sense of mission, and an ability to deal constructively with conflict and change.

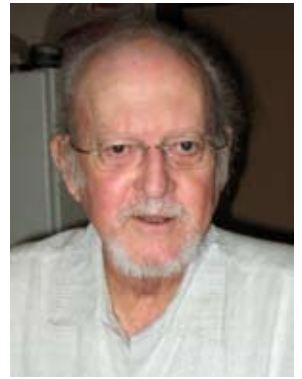
The Baylor study, *Values and Beliefs of the American Public*, contains very interesting information on attitudes toward homosexuality and civil liberties for gays and lesbians. A majority of Americans, 65%, now favor same-sex civil unions, and 47% favor gay marriage and oppose laws prohibiting it. The degree of recent change is remarkable, and it puts the Episcopal Church on the side of public opinion. Sexuality is an important 2012 election issue, but, in the churches, the furor is beginning to die down, largely because of major changes in the public mind. While it remains a major point of division between more liberal and more conservative constituencies, the conservative hope of using the sexuality debate as a means for gaining control now seems doomed to failure. The public is getting to be done with the issue, and younger people in particular don't see what all the fuss is about.

The gathered statistics show more interaction between religious groups, and more concern with ecumenism. Spirituality is more diffuse, but participation in a congregation is still important to many people. Fewer participate merely because it is their heritage, more because the congregation has worked to foster relationships. Openness, hospitality, and effective communication are important elements of mission because they are inviting, and often work better than the kind of confrontation which thinks it can browbeat people into heaven. Many now see involvement with religiously different groups as positive rather than as spiritually polluting. Some ecumenical discussion groups are finding that they have shared spiritual concerns despite sharp historical and formal differences arising partly from past political conflicts. In other words, American religious diversity doesn't necessarily lead to religious homogeneity, but, rather, to a situation in which different traditions are more effectively presented and more joyfully celebrated, largely because people perceive that the purposes of God are larger than we know.

Dealing with change has been hard on everyone. Protestant and Roman Catholic churches are struggling to maintain structures created in the past to deal with a rapidly growing population moving into strange new circumstances. The Roman Catholics created a parallel school system to keep its children away from the protestant-dominated public schools. It was an amazing creation, but it now faces declining funding and dropping enrollment. Parish systems are having to be realigned as urban populations move and change. Similarly, the colleges and seminaries created to educate leadership are now struggling to become self-supporting and competitive, as are related hospitals. The churches can no longer finance them: they often benefit from a greater degree of freedom from outside control but sponsoring churches often feel a sense of loss and failure.

The situation calls for creative adaptive changes--not abandonment of tradition, but openness to new ways of communicating and new kinds of leadership. Probably the worst response to change is a programmatic effort to reverse decline. It falsifies the situation by blaming decline on leadership or vague evil forces, but sets the church up for failure because the program doesn't address the realities facing us. We need, rather, a new birth of faith and hope, confident and joyful rather than blaming and resentful.

***Holy Baptism***

Holy Baptism is especially appropriate at the Easter Vigil, on the Day of Pentecost, on All Saints' Day or the Sunday after All Saints' Day, and on the Feast of the Baptism of our Lord (the First Sunday after the Epiphany). It is recommended that, as far as possible, Baptisms be reserved for these occasions or when a Bishop is present. (BCP, page 312)

In addition to these set days, Bishop Thompson will make his annual visitation on September 30 so baptisms may be scheduled then. Please contact Canon Roberts to schedule a baptism.
