From The Dean...

Over the summer, Vestry members along with other lay leaders and Cathedral staff members have been exploring the best way to engage the congregation in a conversation about goals and priorities for the coming decade. Surveys (both written and internet based) are a common tool to generate data, however, they lack the depth of person to person communication. Ideally, we would like to create an opportunity for the leaders of the parish to hear directly from as many of our worshipping community as possible. As we seek to discern and live into God's vision for us, it will be helpful to know as much as possible about the talents and dreams of you who consider this your spiritual home. By learning more about you, the members of our Parish, the leadership hopes to be better able to create opportunities for connections among parishioners with similar interests and abilities. We also look forward to new ideas for ministry that we hope you will share with us during these conversations.



You may remember, in 2001, the Cathedral leadership facilitated a self-study of the congregation in order to provide a road map for the next Dean. When called to undertake this office in 2002, I was grateful for the fruits of this work as it gave me a set of priorities and goals within which to focus my time and energy. These were: parish administration, liturgical consistency, improved lighting and sound in the worship space, neighborhood engagement, raising our community profile and improving our relationship with the Bishop and wider Diocese.

As we grow ever more fully into the unique ministry of being a Cathedral in the twenty-first century, the goals identified in 2001 remain critical. It is my sense, however, that we have made significant progress in these areas, while new challenges and opportunities have opened up before us in the intervening years. Thus, in 2012 the time seems ripe to again engage the congregation in conversation about goals and priorities for the next decade. Please keep the Vestry in your prayers as we continue to design this process that we are calling "VisionQuest 2012". I will keep you updated as more details emerge.

***Confirmation, Reception and Baptism:
Bishop Thompson's Annual Visitation
Sunday, September 30 at the 10 AM service***

Confirmation is a sacrament and a liturgy within the church by which an individual makes a mature public profession of his or her baptismal vows and a desire to live out that faith journey within the Episcopal Church. It is symbolized in the church by the reaffirmation of baptismal promises and the laying on of hands by a bishop. Reception is similar to Confirmation, but it is the formal welcoming, by our bishop, of an individual who has been confirmed in the Roman Catholic Church.

In preparation for Confirmation or Reception, we provide information about the church in classes that will meet following the 10 AM service during the Coffee Hour Class. We will explore our theology, ministry, history, polity, and understanding of scripture. Classes will begin August 19 and will continue for 5 weeks (not including Labor Day weekend). These classes are open to everyone, whether you are already confirmed or just interested in more information about the church.





RELIGION IN THIS ELECTION YEAR



ELECTIONS do not merely choose among candidates. They also bring our several visions of America into critical review, including--or perhaps especially--our religious ones. While the U. S. Constitution stipulates that there is no religious test for standing for office, many voters consider religion important in choosing among candidates. They want to know if their religious commitments form and support the character and views they regard as important. This is particularly true with regard to candidates for President.

POLLS indicate that many people are unsure of President Obama's religion, despite saturation coverage of the liberation theology sermons of his Chicago pastor (a United Methodist), whom he finally repudiated. Denial may be a greater problem than lack of information: Our adjustment to our first African-American President has not always been gracious or graceful. More than 30% opine that the President is really a Muslim, and some believe that he was foreign-born, despite the public display of his birth certificate--all ways of not accepting the legitimacy of his election.

MITT ROMNEY'S Mormonism also troubles people. Discomfort with Mormons dates from Mormonism's first emergence, in the 1830s, when it presented itself as different--a divinely-sponsored restoration of Christianity and the only possessor of the truth. Its sweeping claims and bravado evoked hatred and fierce persecution. Mormon leaders eventually responded by migrating clean out of the United States to the Salt Lake Valley, in Utah, to establish a kingdom of the saints. American expansion militated against continued isolation, however, and the Mormon's plan B was to seek statehood. They abolished plural marriage, in theory, if not in practice, and played down many of their distinctive doctrines without abandoning them. Now they present themselves as generically Christian. Their many doctrinal oddities are kept out of sight, because Mormonism is actually unrelated to Christianity, theologically or historically, despite its hijacking of Christian vocabulary and large parts of the King James translation of the Bible. They are not 'just like us.' A constructive suggestion about terminology has come from among the Baptists: regard Mormonism as a fourth Abrahamic faith, alongside Judaism, Christianity, and Islam--a description that's accurate and not polemic.

RELIGION in election years also becomes a focus of hope, especially when times are bad. People want God to restore prosperity and joy to a situation where everything seems to have gone wrong, and to heal the infirmities of the churches as well. The times are troubled and so are the churches. As diversity increases, denominational loyalty is less important. Divisions that used to run between churches now run through them. Many religious bodies have experienced fragmentation or bitter and highly public divisions. The competitive parish system is now on steroids, with angry splinter groups vying for loyalty and control of property. Mainline churches are paying a price for leading the way in social reform, for working to secure acceptance of racial and sexual diversity. Evangelicals, on the other hand, are disillusioned with politics. They offered their loyalty and votes to politicians who often ignored them, failing to see that ambivalence and compromise are always part of the deal in democratic participation. Now some see the American Republic as a missionary failure, almost chosen yet probably doomed.

FINANCIAL TROUBLES are affecting almost everyone. The religious infrastructure developed during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries--an amazing array of parishes, schools, colleges, seminaries, hospitals, orphanages, and other institutions--is costly to maintain and difficult to change. Changes in priorities for funding are often perceived as betrayals or defeats, yet business as usual may mean that new needs cannot be addressed, no matter how pressing. Since the institutions affected are places of personal experience and commitment, changes often leave people with a painful sense of loss, disloyalty and desertion. That can produce backward-looking voters, looking for candidates who will put things back the way they used to be, and halt the relentless tide of change in American realities and institutions.

ACTUALLY, however, religion is not about stopping change in its tracks. It is about our future in God, no matter what happens. That is the essential message we have to proclaim, and we should do it.

Holy Baptism

Holy Baptism is especially appropriate at the Easter Vigil, on the Day of Pentecost, on All Saints' Day or the Sunday after All Saints' Day, and on the Feast of the Baptism of our Lord (the First Sunday after the Epiphany). It is recommended that, as far as possible, Baptisms be reserved for these occasions or when a Bishop is present. (BCP, page 312)

In addition to these set days, Bishop Thompson will make his annual visitation on September 30 so baptisms will be scheduled then. Please contact Canon Roberts to schedule a baptism.

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

Spirituality of the Desert Fathers Workshop

Renowned expert on the Desert Fathers Roberta Bondi will be conducting a workshop on the sayings of the Desert Fathers, *Let Love Lead: Finding Spiritual Guidance from Desert Sayings*. Dr. Bondi, retired professor from Candler Theological Seminary at Emory University, is considered the leading expert on the Desert Fathers and Mothers, our earliest contemplatives in the Christian tradition. The workshop is sponsored by the School for Contemplative Living, an ecumenical ministry supported by Parker United Methodist Church and Rayne Memorial Methodist Church.

The workshop, which will be held at St. Luke's United Methodist Church, 5875 Canal Blvd. begins with registration at 6 p.m. on Friday, September 29th, with an evening session from 7-9 p.m. It continues on Saturday, September 30th, from 10 a.m. - 3 p.m. The fee of \$60 includes a catered lunch.

Today's news featured a Colorado software company owner with a unique benefit he offered his workers. In addition to their usual paid vacation time, they would get a \$7500 bonus if one week of that time was "unplugged" from all electronic devices -- cell phones, computers, pad computers. He explained that his is a start-up company requiring intense creativity of his employees. They cannot provide such creativity if they are never "off-line."

Bernard of Clairvaux put it another way: "Service," he said, "flows from an overflowing heart." As September ends our summer doldrums and programs ramp up at work, at school, and in our civic and church life, it is good to remember that we need to plan time to recharge without plugging in.

We can start by remembering that God gave us the example by taking a sabbath. Sabbath time reminds us that God is in charge -- and that the world will go on spinning without our efforts. Between homework and working from home, it is difficult to carve out that time, but it is important to remember that the word "time" contains both the word "it" and the word "me." Often, we are so focused on the "it" that needs to be done that we do not focus on the "me" that needs to be developed -- or even encountered.

I am as guilty as anyone else of getting so absorbed in projects that I forget to schedule coffee with friends or to finish that mystery I was reading. I can forget how good it feels to have a leisurely meal or just to sit in the backyard and watch the sparrows negotiate over the feeder (or the squirrels plan their latest raid). And yet, when I don't get the recreation (re-creation) I need, I find myself feeling listless and dull, physically and spiritually.

To remedy the situation, I have been taking an "Internet" sabbath on Fridays, my normal day off. I don't answer email and I respond only to emergency calls. I plan time to just relax and do nothing. At first that was very hard, but I am finding it easier as I go along and I find I am much more ready to do chores on Saturday and to return to work on Sunday.

You might try that with yourself and with your family. Though it is a challenge between soccer games and music lessons, homework and housework, dedicate a time for yourself -- just yourself -- each week. With a young family, it cannot be a whole day, but maybe you can carve out a special corner -- maybe a chair and a lamp and table in the bedroom which is your "zone out" zone -- whatever that means to you -- and train your family, spouse, or significant other to give you space when you are in that sacred space. With older children, setting a timer for your rewarding "time out" might be a successful strategy.

Besides creating time in each day or week to be rather than to do, it is important to schedule time for spiritual refreshment. Although that may include saying appointed prayers, it may also simply be time when you empty your mind of "to-dos" and "should-haves" and simply sit -- or as one spiritual advisor told his advisee to do, "Just sit and knit." It was a way of unsnagging her mind from all the obstacles to being in God's presence -- and her own.

It is also important to plan longer spaces of time. Both Advent House and Solomon Episcopal Conference Center can schedule private retreats. We have a wonderful opportunity coming to New Orleans on September 29th and 30th to hear Roberta Bondi speak about the spirituality of the Desert Fathers (see announcement elsewhere in *The Canticle*) and on October 11 the SECC hosts the Annual Women's Creative Process Retreat. [Also scheduled at SECC is our own Cathedral Get Away on December 7-9. -*Laurie Bailey*]

Whatever you decide to do during the September ramp-up, remember that, ultimately, God created you to be a part of the human race, not the rat race.
