

From The Dean . . .

As emerging disciples of Jesus, our lives center on the disciplines of *prayer, worship, service and formation*. Responding to an ever-deepening sense of God's intense love for us, we seek ways to abide in his love by growing into Jesus' statement that *the work of God is to believe in the One that God sent. (John 6:29)* As your spiritual home, Christ Church Cathedral strives to provide you with numerous opportunities to engage these various facets of the life of faith.



Our three distinct Sunday masses offer a broad spectrum of Anglican liturgical tradition, and the intimate daily services in the Chapel invite worshippers to step out of the routine of weekday life and bask for a time in the holy rhythm of God's time. Then there are the more individualized opportunities for Centering Prayer, Yoga, Meditation and Spiritual Direction. As Director of Advent House, *Mother Bridget* can always help you discern your unique path to a richer faith life.

Throughout the year there are multiple opportunities to serve the poor and marginalized in our community; sometimes this entails raising funds or donating tangible items and, on other occasions, it is by direct ministry among these most beloved of God's children. For example, the Cathedral is sponsoring a week of meals every quarter at *Grace at the Greenlight*, a ministry serving the street homeless population (based out of Danny's Food Store at 2100 Earhart Avenue). During each of these weeks we will also be invited to provide volunteers to help serve and greet those being served by this program. Watch the monthly Canticle and weekly email notices for details about these various opportunities, and remember that Deacon Priscilla Maumus (deacon @ccnola.org) is a valuable resource in matching your individual gifts and interests with various ministry possibilities that are always presenting themselves.

Finally, there are a variety of small group offerings designed to enhance your knowledge of Christian scripture, tradition and theology. In addition to ongoing Bible and Book Studies, House Church, Potlucks and Education for Ministry, there are several new offerings described elsewhere in this *Canticle* from Theologian in Residence Canon David Lowry (whose Biography is also included herein). There are several offerings daily, including at least one just before or following the weekday Masses so participants can share in worship and formation in one stop! On Sundays, Canon Lowry and Canon Roberts are beginning a new worship experience for the K-6 age group beginning at 9:50 AM (see details below) and we will continue the weekly class for grades 7-12 following the 10 AM service. We also plan to offer periodic adult programs during the Coffee Hour time, which will be publicized in *The Canticle* and weekly bulletins. The Good Shepherd Atrium will normally be open and staffed for younger children during the Adult Coffee Hour/Forum time as well. Elsewhere in this Canticle you will also find a monthly schedule of youth events designed to enhance the community building within that crucial age group. More detailed information about any of these programs, classes and events is available from the designated leader(s) as well as by contacting the Cathedral office. I sincerely pray that you will take advantage of as many of these offerings as possible, and that God continues to richly bless our faith community as a new season of rich and varied Spiritual growth unfolds.

Walking the Way of St. James

For over a thousand years, people have found that making a pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela in Spain was a life-changing and soul-renewing experience. Popularized by visits from Pope John Paul II and the film, "The Way" starring Charlie Sheen, the Camino de Santiago continues to attract thousands of people every year. Since we are all pilgrims on the journey of life, walking the Camino is a metaphor for the trials and tribulations, as well as the joys and beauty, to be found in walking the Way. Fr. Heine will share the life lessons he learned when he and his son walked the Camino in the summer of 2013. Even if you're probably not going to walk or ride this 500 mile, 30 day pilgrimage, come and hear the spiritual fruits that walking the way offers for all of us.

Baptism

is especially appropriate at the Easter Vigil, on the Day of Pentecost, on All Saints' Day or the Sunday after All Saints' Day, and on the Feast of the Baptism of our Lord (the First Sunday after the Epiphany).

It is recommended that, as far as possible, Baptisms be reserved for these occasions or when a Bishop is present. (BCP, page 312). *Our next opportunity for baptism is November 1.* Please contact Canon Roberts for more information.



Confirmation, Reception, Baptisms

On Sunday, September 13, Bishop Thompson makes his annual visitation at which time he will confirm and receive persons into the Episcopal Church.

Baptism, performed at any age, is the Sacrament of initiation into the Christian faith. The Prayer Book also provides a rite of Confirmation, which is when previously Baptized persons re-affirm their Baptismal promises and receive the laying on of hands by a Bishop, thus becoming Episcopalian (fun fact: when a Bishop baptizes an adult that serves as confirmation as well). The Bishop also receives persons into the Episcopal Church who have been confirmed in another denomination by a Bishop provided that denomination has a theology of the Historic Episcopate consistent with that of the Episcopal Church.



Confirmation is one of the oldest sacraments of the Church. In the book of Acts, the Apostles laid their hands on believers so that they would receive the Holy Spirit. This rite of laying on hands became connected to Baptism, and the two formed one rite. With the rise in popularity of infant baptism, the laying on of hands was delayed until an age of maturity (usually between the ages of 12 and 16) and became an opportunity for Christians who had been baptized as infants to make their own, mature confession of faith.

Coffee Hour



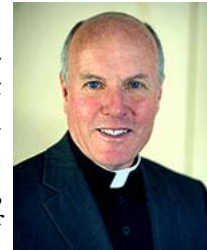

The Rev'd Canon David B. Lowry, Ph.D.

Canon David Lowry is theologian in Residence at Christ Church Cathedral Cathedral. He is also currently co-writing a book about business ethics and the future of religion in a hyper-globalized world. Ordained in 1972, he served as curate and rector of Christ Church, Manhasset, New York, rector of Church of the Nativity, Indianapolis, Indiana, canon pastor of the Cathedral of the Incarnation, Garden City, New York and Dean of Christ Church Cathedral in New Orleans. He was associate professor of Biblical studies and Interim Dean of the Mercer School of Theology in the Diocese of Long Island and Interim Director of the Desmond Tutu Center at the General Theological Seminary. He is president of the board Children's Orchestra Society of New York and a member of the board of missions for the highlands of West Papua, New Guinea. From 1990 until 2004 he served as a vice president for the Freeport-McMoRan companies and president of the Freeport-McMoRan Foundation.

New Christian Formation Offerings for Adults

“Forming the Faith of the Children of Israel through Struggle and Triumph: A Study of the Old Testament”

Old Testament classes usually begin the Genesis and progress, more-or-less, through the Tanakh (Old Testament). We are going to try something different: we will begin with the books of 1 and 2 Samuel and 1 and 2 Kings and supplement them with the books of the prophets Amos, Jeremiah and Isaiah, chapters 1-39. Why? Because these were the first Old Testament books to be written and reflect the deep crisis of political will and theological understanding that overcame the people of Israel and Judah in the late 8th through the early 6th centuries BCE. This was the period of the Assyrian and Babylonian conquests of the Israelites. We will use history to view theology and myth, rather than allowing theology and myth to create history. We will then look at the history and theology of restoration Israel, using the books of Ezra and Nehemiah and Isaiah 40-66. Only after this (rather lengthy excursion) will we turn our attention to the Pentateuch (Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus and Deuteronomy). We will close our study outside the regular Old Testament with the Apocryphal books of Maccabees and supplement those books with the prophetic book Daniel, which will introduce us to the Israel and Diaspora that was so important to Jesus, Paul and the compilers of the Gospels. Other than an Old Testament (preferably with annotation - we recommend *The New Oxford Annotated Bible*), no books are needed. Leader: Canon David Lowry

*“What can the Inklings teach us about the World today?
A Study of Literature, Faith and Wonder”*

From the early 1930s, through the agonies of World War II and on to the early 1950s a small group of intellectuals met regularly in pubs and the rooms around Oxford University to “drink, smoke, cavil, read aloud their works in progress and endure or enjoy with as much grace as they could muster the sometimes blistering critiques that followed.” They came to call themselves ‘The Inklings.’ Four are most famous: C. S. Lewis, J. R. Tolkien, Charles Williams and Owen Barfield. In their own ways they sought to come to grips with a world that was changing. They struggled through the meaning of nation, world - and especially faith: they wondered about the evil that lurked in 20th century Europe. They used their struggles to look at myth, faith and the human condition. Although our world is different from theirs in specific challenges, it has great similarities as well. A new book has been written about the Inklings. Philip and Carol Zaleski have lovingly chronicled the intellectual and spiritual writings of Lewis, Tolkien, Williams and Barfield (*The Fellowship: The Literary Lives of the Inklings*). Although we highly recommend the book, reading the book is not necessary. Rather we will read and discuss one or two major works by each of Inklings: Tolkien’s *The Hobbit*, Lewis’ *Till we have Faces: A Myth Retold* and from The Chronicles of Narnia, *The Lion, the Witch and Wardrobe* and *The Battle*. From the lesser known Inklings we will read and discuss Williams’ *All Hallows’ Eve* and Barfield’s *Saving the Appearances: A Study in Idolatry* (a very different book from the others). New Sunday Morning Worship/Formation for Children, K-6

“Let the Little Children Come to Me”: Experiencing the Love of Christ”

On Sundays beginning September 20 we will offer a new learning experience for children who are in Kindergarten through those in 6th grade. It is designed to engage children in a variety of study, experiences and fellowship that will help them understand better the love of God and Christ and in our community of love—the church. The program will combine time for learning and fellowship that is appropriate for children while also having the children join their families for the Eucharistic celebration in the Cathedral. At 9:50 AM the children will gather in the Nurturing Center (next to the Parish Hall Kitchen). Breakfast will be served for the children and their teachers. At 10:10 the educational program will begin. It will conclude at 10:40 when the children will come to the Cathedral to join their families for the consecration of the bread and wine and the communion of the faithful.

Canon Roberts and Canon Lowry, former dean of Christ Church Cathedral and now Theologian in Residence, will be the primary clergy leaders for the program. Adults and teenagers from the Cathedral congregation will assist. Willing and loving volunteers are needed and will be lovingly trained.

72 Hours for a Miracle

Every month 300-400 people return to the greater New Orleans metropolitan area from prison. It is extremely important that they unite with their families, acquire housing and integrate into their communities for successful reincorporation into society. Integration includes job training and placement, substance abuse counseling, life skills training, job mentoring and spiritual support.

Louisiana State Penitentiary (LSP) officials maintain that “when an offender returns to the community, he or she faces the stigma of incarceration, making the offender feel uncertain, sometimes fearful, as they return home. The community contributes to these feelings by maintaining a distance from the offender. As a result, the offender experiences difficulty finding meaningful employment and suitable housing.”

It is important to note that many formerly incarcerated persons have no welcoming family or community for return. A faith community will be the one that creates the welcoming back change for that person through resources, strategies and fellowship. Failure to achieve the basics of reincorporation within 72 hours of release results in a sixty percent recidivism to prison within 2-3 years. The lack of a family or mentor support system is considered the primary cause of non-felony offenders’ return to prison because they could not meet the basic requirements of their parole.

The Louisiana State Penitentiary (LSP), also known as Angola or The Farm, is the largest maximum security prison in the United States in charge of 6,300 Located on the site of a former plantation, it occupies 28 square miles (an area the size of Manhattan) and still operates as a farm with cattle husbandry and substantial crop production. Approximately three-quarters of the population is African-American and one-quarter is Caucasian and Latino. Seventy percent of offenders are serving life sentences, the largest number of inmates in any prison in America. Almost two percent, or 125 inmates at Angola, are sentenced to death.

LSP does “provide basic broad-based educational programs” to those who are “motivated to take advantage of these services and have demonstrated behavior that would enable them to func-

tion within an educational setting.” GED, Adult Basic Education classes and vocational school training are offered including automotive technology, carpentry, culinary arts, graphic communications, horticulture and welding. Unfortunately, it is reported that of those released from LSP, fifty percent return to prison. Inmates who participated in educational programs and are released have a recidivism rate of thirty percent.

“I was in prison, and ye came unto me.” (KJV) St. Matthew 25:36

The visitation of prisoners is a time-honored Christian tradition of service, and is an excellent opportunity to share hope, comfort and an invitation into a salvation experience. Potential opportunities for our faith community to serve those formerly incarcerated in the reintegration process into our city include food preparation for meals at family unification dinners, monetary donations to housing social service agencies such as UNITY of Greater New Orleans and mentoring opportunities at off-site neutral locations for employment procurement and retention. Pray, as we invite the newly released to be people of thanksgiving not just for freedom, but for new life.

A native of Texas, Robert is a life-long Episcopalian who has lived in Texas, Washington, D.C., Maryland, in addition to Louisiana. He holds a BBA from Baylor and an MBA from SMU and worked in the commercial real estate and financial industries before retiring to New Orleans and joining us at Christ Church Cathedral. He has served as a Chalice Bearer at St. Michael and All Angels in Dallas and on the vestry and the Phoenix Project at Trinity Episcopal Church in Galveston. He recently attended the “Welcome Home Sunday” hosted by Dillard University, a collaborative effort by the Mayor’s Office, Louisiana State Penitentiary, the U.S. Attorney, The Archdiocese of New Orleans and numerous other faith organizations. The program featured testimonials by formerly incarcerated citizens and education about resources and strategies for returning them the community. FRANCE, 1939

In the quiet village of Carriveau, Vianne Mauriac says goodbye to her husband, Antoine, as he heads for the Front. She doesn’t believe that the Nazis will invade France ... but invade they do, in droves of marching soldiers, in caravans of trucks and tanks, in planes that fill the skies and drop bombs upon the innocent. When a German captain requisitions Vianne’s home, she and her daughter must live with the enemy or lose everything. Without food or money or hope, as danger escalates all around them, she is forced to make one impossible choice after another to keep her family alive.

Vianne’s sister, Isabelle, is a rebellious eighteen-year-old girl, searching for purpose with all the reckless passion of youth. While thousands of Parisians march into the unknown terrors of war, she meets G aetan, a partisan who believes the French can fight the Nazis from within France, and she falls in love as only the young can ... completely. But when he betrays her, Isabelle joins the Resistance and never looks back, risking her life time and again to save others.

When we feel finished discussing this book, we will begin reading our Presiding Bishop elect, Michael Curry’s latest, “*Crazy Christians: A Call to Follow Jesus*.”

“We need some Christians who are as crazy as the Lord. Crazy enough to love like Jesus, to give like Jesus, to forgive like Jesus, to do justice, love mercy, walk humbly with God— like Jesus. Crazy enough to dare to change the world from the nightmare it often is into something close to the dream that God dreams for it. And for those who would follow him, those who would be his disciples, those who would live as and be the people of the Way? It might come as a shock, but they are called to craziness.” - from Bishop Curry’s “*Crazy Christians*” address to the 2012 General Convention of the Episcopal Church in Indianapolis



There’s a new face at Jericho Road Episcopal Housing Initiative...that’s Aaron Juarez. Aaron joins Jericho Road as the eighth fellow from Grinnell College’s Grinnell Corp program - a year-long fellowship modeled after the Peace Corp in which Grinnell College graduates spend a year working with organizations around the world.

A California central coast native, at Grinnell Aaron majored in Human Ecology, focusing on topics related to urban planning and public health.
