

From The Dean . . .

Advent: the Christian season of hopeful expectation; the season during which we prepare our hearts and homes to welcome the coming of Christ, both his human incarnation in first century Palestine, and his promised return to bring to fruition God's plan for the World's salvation. Yet, as I write these words from Jerusalem, this city has endured a horrific week of bloody violence and unconscionable unilateral retribution: on the spot military execution of alleged knife wielding attackers, one only 11 years old without benefit of Judge, jury or due process of any kind. Then, just hours ago the World watched in horror as multiple attackers ripped through the City of Paris and once again showed the vile and hateful toxicity of extremism. How can we even speak the word "hope" amidst act after act of nihilistic barbarism? The answer to this question for me comes from a much unexpected place.



THE CANTICLE

Gaza is often called the World's largest prison, and this is no Euphemism. Almost two million people live on 150 Square Miles (New Orleans is on 200 Square Miles). The borders with adjoining Israel and Egypt are virtually impenetrable, and although Gaza is on the Mediterranean coast, Israeli military patrols limit their ocean access to three miles (six is the international norm) prohibiting the viability of fishing as an industry. There is only intermittent electricity (also controlled by Israel and routinely off for 13 hours daily) and industrial facilities were bombed to rubble in the 2014 war. Unemployment is currently at 43%, and the limited land once available for agricultural production was also bombed to the point of infertility, thus 80% of the population depends on international food aid for basic subsistence.

In the middle of this wasteland stands the Al Ahli Arab Hospital, a ministry of the Anglican Diocese of Jerusalem. Under the auspices of Archbishop Suheil Dawani, I was granted a rare permit to visit Gaza and Al Ahli during my recent trip to Palestine for the Spafford Children's Center board meeting. The hospital occupies a full square block in the old town of Gaza City. It is one of the few Christian entities in Gaza, and, considering that there are barely 1000 Christians left in the entire territory, Al Ahli's continued existence is a miracle in itself. There is room for 200 beds, but currently only capacity to sustain 50. Basic medicines and supplies are hard to come by and yet, because of its reputation for neutrality and skill, Al Ahili has been asked by the Hamas Government (whose state run larger hospitals have no capacity to pay staff salaries) to help with the 2000 child waiting list for routine tonsillectomies.

Suheila Tarazi has served as the hospital's director for decades, and after several hours of hearing from her about the bleakness of the current situation, I asked her where she finds the strength to keep fighting what she candidly describes as a losing battle. Without skipping a beat she replied that Our Lord Jesus Christ called us to serve the weakest and poorest of God's children and told us to have faith even when there is no logical reason to do so. After all, he was not comfortable hanging on the cross but still he didn't lash out at those who taunted him but instead offered them forgiveness. I will never forget the sincerity and power of Suheila's words. Of course, this is not new information, but her ability to look hopelessness in the face and find strength instead of despair gave me an intense reminder of what Christian discipleship is all about. As we walk through the days of Advent preparation, I pray that God continually grants us the faith to seek within the darkness of our present age the dawning of his kingdom of light.

Let us welcome Jericho Road's new team members!!! Peter Davis (Development and Communications Coordinator), Tenaj Jones (Neighborhood Engagement Coordinator) and Matthew Gonzales (Environmental Sustainability Coordinator). They have joined Jericho Road through the AmeriCorp VISTA Program. 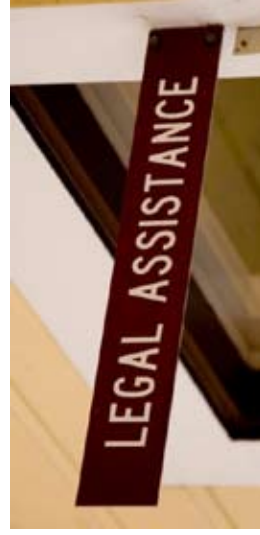
